GOALS & STRATEGIES, 2023-2030

The Strategies listed under each Goal below are the City Council's initial priorities to ensure progress on achieving the Strategic Plan while recognizing the ongoing services, management and non-discretionary work that consume most City resources.

1. Enhance organizational and fiscal stability.

- A. Improve staff retention, recruitment, mental health and wellness resources, and increase staffing for rising workloads.
- B. Consider possible tax and bond measures for 2024.
- C. Prioritize implementation of the Economic Opportunities Study.

2. Improve and steward City infrastructure, streets and facilities.

- A. Complete selected stormwater and flooding improvements citywide
- B. Advance the Beach Boulevard Resiliency and Esplanade Protection Projects (including the Pier, as feasible).
- C. Pursue planning and financing for the Library projects.
- D. Develop a Facilities and Equipment Plan for Public Safety and the Community Center



GOALS & STRATEGIES, 2023-2030

3. Prioritize protection and development of affordable housing.

- A. Complete the Housing Element Update.
- B. Update the Short-Term Rental Ordinance.
- C. Prioritize Housing Element program implementation.

4. Pursue climate change adaptation and mitigation.

- A. Update the Climate Action and Adaptation Plan, including performance targets.
- B. Continue the urban forestry management plan, tree canopy goals, inventory and projects.
- C. Update Pacifica's Local Coastal Plan and improve communications and collaboration with the California Coastal Commission.

5. Broaden public communications and collaboration.

- A. Creatively and appropriately leverage community expertise and volunteers to advance City priorities.
- B. Increase communications, education, and connections for community mental health resources.




Civic Center Renovation

Beach Boulevard Infrastructure Resiliency Project


- June 2021 Council approval of hybrid solution:
 - Deep foundation seawall
 - Rock Scour Apron
 - Beach Nourishment
- ➤ Preliminary Design began in early 2023
- ➤ Grants/Funding pursuit continuing





Housing Element

- Two well-attended community meetings and public comment period
- City Council/Planning Commission joint study session
- Draft submitted to CA Housing & Community Development May 10, 2023 for 90-day review period
- Completion TBD, depending on HCD review





Streets Paving

- >Streets Maintenance Plan implemented in 2020 (to be updated every 5 years)
- Plan is *helping*: Pavement Condition Index for overall street condition increased from lowest in Bay Area of 42 in 2021 to 49 in 2023
- ➤ But still poor quality overall
- ➤ Significant \$ needed to continue gradual improvement, \$3.5 6.5 million/year
- Currently annual budget only can allocate \$1.5-2 million/year









Local Coastal Land Use Plan


- ➤ Update to 1980 LCLUP underway since 2017
- > 2020 adoption by City Council
- ➤ June 2020-Feb 2023 Coastal Commission staff review
- > Staff currently reviewing CCC staff comments

Climate Action & Adaptation Plan

Formation of Task Force underway

Short-term Rentals

- ➤ Council adopted cap at 150 (subject to Coastal Commission approval)
- Thorough review of ordinance scheduled to begin FY2023-24






BUDGET STATUS

Measure Y helps bridge the previously reported ongoing structural deficit for a balanced budget in FY2023-24 and beyond, but does not leave any margin for service enhancements and ongoing investments in capital infrastructure.

BUDGET STATUS

→ On-going Challenges:

- Due to historical expenditure reductions, staffing levels are 23% less (average across all departments) than comparable cities in the region;
- This staffing deficit translates to 45+ positions citywide Pacifica does not have compared to similar agencies, which limits organizational capacity to deliver services;
- 45 positions = \$5 to 6 million in annual operating revenue (@ avg \$125K/position, salary + benefits)
- Pacifica's employee total compensation (salary+benefits) is significantly below market for most positions, which affects recruitment and retention of talented employees;
- Limited revenue affects ability to fund Capital Improvement Program;
- Unfunded State mandates and take-aways.

Opportunities & Solutions

- Dedicated and hard-working staff with an unwavering public service ethic;
- Expenditure containment: innovation in service delivery and prudent budgeting;
- Revenue enhancement strategies: economic development, grants, future tax measures;
- Community support (e.g., Measure Y, volunteerism)
